

# East Harling & Kenninghall Medical Practice

It's been some time since the Surgery provided an update and this is the first since I took over as Practice Manager early last year.

Much hard work has been going on behind the scenes and I would like to bring you up to date with what we have achieved.

The Practice went through a period of flux, with a number of familiar faces, both clinical and non-clinical, moving to pastures new and this in turn meant we had to utilise locum clinicians to ensure we continued to provide medical services for our patients. Whilst these clinicians plugged the gap, we fully appreciate that continuity of care was lost when having to use locum staff.

I am delighted to say we are now back to full staffing levels, having secured the services of two new salaried GPs: Dr. Staliuniene, working 8 sessions/week and Dr. Kemp who is working 4 sessions/week and GP provision is further supplemented by Dr. Mehrotra, a long-term locum, who is working 6 sessions/week.

We have revived our Patient Participation Group (PPG) which are now a very pro-active and supportive group made up of volunteer patients from all corners of the Practice area and who meet on a regular 6/8-week basis. Their focus is on forging positive links with patients and the wider community, particularly the local schools, who are very much on-board with this collaboration.

Furthermore, you may be aware that we underwent our CQC Inspection back in June last year but, contrary to rumour, we have still not received our report. The Chair of our PPG emailed a complaint on behalf of the PPG, at the end of January, and an email was received with the following response:

"You may have seen articles in the media recently outlining some of the challenges CQC are facing with their technology, including issues with generating reports. There have been some recent updates that have been put in place and we are

making some progress with the assessments that have been impacted. As soon as we are at the point of preparing to send a draft to the service for factual accuracy, we will let you know".

Finally for this update, the Covid Spring Booster campaign starts on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2025 for patients aged 75 and over and those in the eligible cohorts. We have sent out messages informing patients that we will again be running clinics for patients to receive their vaccine in April, with the first date being Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> April at East Harling Surgery.

  strengths of a "three" unitary solution in
  Norfolk, particularly relative to the
  weaknesses of a large single unitary council.
  This evidence will be published with our
  Council papers shortly, and will be debated by
  Members.

#### Wretham & Hockham Railway

The Act to build a railway linking Thetford and Watton was passed in 1866 and awarded to J S Valentine as its engineer. Works began in earnest and the line was opened for freight on 28<sup>th</sup> January 1869 and from 18<sup>th</sup> October that year for passengers. The line ran from Roudham Junction with the stations Hockham & Wretham, and Stow Bedon and onto Watton.

Because it had links via other networks to the coast, it became affectionately known as the Crab and Winkle and many generations of schoolboys and girls used the stations to get to Thetford Grammar Schools.

In WW2 the Americans built a number of sidings, to cope with the transport of the large amounts of equipment and supplies for Wretham air base. Old carriages can still be seen in a few gardens.

The old station house at Wretham is obvious when you realise where it is and the A1075 was crossed at this point and again at Stow Bedon. The Pingo trail uses quite a large section of the now disused line.

When Beeching's report came out it was inevitable that the line would be closed and the last passenger train ran on 12<sup>th</sup> June 1964 followed a year later by the freight service.

You can still trace the line and many of the fences that lined the tracks are still in place today.

#### **Defibrillator**

#### **A Question of Balance**

What do you do if you are short of space in your garden, have a *really* favourite plant but find that its flowers don't last very long? Should you be put off using it or are there ways you might get round its shortcomings?

First off, your favourite isn't alone in being just that little bit shy. Flowers aren't everything. Certainly they're not to plants, which see them as just a means to reproduce, and a very expensive one too, so arguably they're not going to produce them just for fun. With many plants, that means no matter what you do a single flush is all you'll get each year, with the plant taking a long breather in between to recover its strength, before its next seasonal foray into the wonderful world of sex. Lots of plants do this, from spring bulbs, to climbers such as wisteria, shrubs like forsythia, and so on. You might get the odd stray blossom later on with some shrubs and climbers, but they're by no means the norm.

Then we have flowering plants which seem to have more reproductive stamina – or possibly they just enjoy it that little bit more – and either put on a longer show, or go at it two or three times a year. Lots of herbaceous plants – from geraniums to catmint and many of the annuals we can sow each year from seed fall into this category. Some of those herbaceous plants, the perennial poppies, for example, will put on a very good show in late summer, if you cut them back very hard, immediately after they've flowered in the spring.

Finally, there are plants that flower for a long time, either because they're made that way, such as one of my favourites, the yellow small-flowered Clematis tangutica, which naturally blooms from June to November, or because the gardener extends their season by removing all the spent flowers ('dead-heading'), as soon as they appear. That fools the plant into thinking it needs to produce some more, if it's to set any seed. If you are lazy and leave the dead flowers on, the plant will merrily set one lot of seed and turn equally

lazy about producing any more flowers. Dahlias are a typical example.

Coming right back to the question, though, to my mind a good garden is one that is of interest to the gardener for most if not all of the year and that interest needn't be exclusively satisfied by flowers: You may be intrigued by the form and colours of some grasses and bamboos, variegated foliage plants such as hostas, or the variations in form and texture of the bark of some small trees, like varieties of acer and birch.

The trick is to plan your garden with that year-round interest in mind. Read-up about your plants, and what they are capable of, plan an interlocking 'pattern' of interest in your plots, and find out if there any tricks you can play (such as dead-heading or cutting back), to get more out of what you've put in. Remember that foliage plants have a role in shaping the form and texture of your garden (as well as supporting some of their neighbours).

Finally, if you feel you have made a mistake, admit it by removing the offending plant to the compost heap and have a go with something else.
